Hall inducts 20 at 11th ceremony

Inductees share honor with family, coaches, teammates, communities

The pictures projected behind the inductees at the Nebraska High School Sports Hall of Fame's induction ceremonies on Sept. 26 sometimes told their own stories.

Ron Witt of Otoe, who graduated in 1954, looked up at a photo of himself in his high school basketball uniform from 50 years earlier and couldn't help but say, "That's a nice picture."

The comment drew a laugh from the 700-plus in attendance at the Lied Center in Lincoln as the Hall of Fame conducted its 11th annual induction ceremony, where 18 athletes, coaches an official and a contributor became the latest inductees.

Henderson standout John Kroeker picked a photo with the Henderson water tower in the background, using that as a tribute to everyone from the smalltown community where he has his roots.

"I appreciated the upbringing in the community. The people of the community were behind me," said Kroeker.

He added that his induction gave him a chance to prove to his children that once upon a time, he was someone special.

Indeed, all of the Hall's inductees were special to Nebraska High School sports.

"It is truly an honor to receive

this award," Witt said. "With all the people who have gone in before and the people are going in today, it's truly an impressive group."


The group included athletes Bob Eickholt of Omaha Holy Name, Diane (Beideck) Van Brocklin and Heather Taggart of Millard North, Bob Churchich of Omaha North, Maury Damkroger of Lincoln Northeast, Kerry Karst of Lincoln East, Susan Marchese of Omaha Duchesne, David Lammel of Millard South, Irv Thode of Loup City. Max Linder of Plattsmouth. Kroeker and Witt.: coaches Sandy Genrich, Richard Beran, Jack McIntire, Phil Sprague, Don Knauss and Pat Panek; and referee Pat Mallette of Blair and contributor Dr. Jack Lewis of Omaha.

The induction gave many a chance to look back on athletic careers that shaped their lives.

"Through sports I have met many wonderful people," Witt said. "Sports are very vital in our high schools today. But one of the very first things that get cut are the activities programs, and they are very, very important."

Genrich, the recently retired Lincoln Northeast volleyball coach, looked back on the first match she coached at Lincoln Pius X.

"We had to call the NSAA

two days later to find out who won," she said. "It was at Holmesville. ... It's 12-8 in the third game and in comes the sheriff with a bullhorn and quickly announced that there was a tornado in Holmesville. We left their Quonset-hut gym, did the drill and covered ourselves in the hallway for the next three hours"

Linder has had to return to

high school sports to watch the younger generation.

"I forgot what the smell of freshly cut grass and fresh popcorn are like. I think they ought to put that in a can," he said.

Churchich dedicated his induction to his brother, Ely, who died during surgery in August.

"He's the guy I followed, wanting to be in his footsteps," Churchich said.

Presnell dies at age 99

2003 inductee played in NFL for Ironton Tanks, Detroit Lions

Glenn Presnell, a 2003 inductee into the Nebraska High School Sports Hall of Fame, died Sept. 13, 2004, at the age of 99.

Presnell was one of the National Football League's oldest living former players.

Presnell, who attended high school in DeWitt, was an All-American running back at Nebraska and Detroit Lions player in the 1930s.

After playing semipro ball for the Ironton, Ohio, Tanks from 1927 to 1930, Presnell joined the Portsmouth Spartans of the NFL, which three years later became the Detroit Lions.

It was in Detroit that Presnell enjoyed his finest NFL seasons, leading the Lions to the 1935 league championship. It was also in Detroit that Presnell earned his best-ever pro football salary of \$4,000.

Presnell led the league in scoring that season and was first team All-Pro. He had earned second team honors before and on Oct. 7, 1934, kicked a then-NFL record 54-yard field goal. The record stood for 19 years.

Presnell retired after nine professional seasons and spent one year as an assistant coach at Kansas, then went to his alma mater Nebraska before serving in the Navy for three years during World War II.

After the war, Presnell was hired at Eastern Kentucky and spent 17 years as head coach and another 11 as the athletic director before retiring in 1974.

Leonard Bond, Omaha North coach and 1998 inductee, dies of cancer

Leonard Bond, a Nebraska High School Sports Hall of Fame inductee in 1998, died Aug. 26, 2004, of cancer at age 81.

Bond taught at North for 27 years and was the Vikings' head football coach for 16.

Bond coached four sports — football, basketball, baseball and track — at Omaha North. He coached the Vikings' freshman and junior varsity football teams for 11 years before

guiding the varsity from 1959 to 1974. His teams won or shared Metro Conference American Division titles four times and went undefeated twice.

Bond coached North's famed Four Norsemen — Bob Churchich, Rick Davis, Danny Miller and Rookie Taylor. Those four, who played together in 1962, made up what's still considered to be one of the best high school backfields in the state.
